Corrections Correspondence Service offers groups, individual AA's a way to give back ... one letter at a time

As the dog days of summer descend on Brooklyn's streets, many of us will head to our borough's parks and beaches — and even through the spray from a nearby open fire hydrant — to cool off and have some fun in the sun. It's all too easy to forget that many of our A.A. fellows are unable to do the same, as they're getting and staying sober in correctional facilities across the country.

While prisons in many jurisdictions allow for on-site 12-step recovery meetings, others do not. The only lifeline to the program that sober men and women in such facilities often have is a letter from an A.A. "on the outside" (i.e., not in jail) who participates in the Corrections Correspondence Service (C.C.S.) program.



Joining is as simple as filling out the form available online at <code>www.aa.org/assets/en_US/f-26correctcorrespondence_form.pdf</code> and then either emailing it to <code>corrections@aa.org</code>, faxing it to 212-870-3003 or "snail-mailing" it by U.S. Postal Service to A.A. World Services. Men are matched with men, and women with women — usually in different parts of the country — and provided with guidelines for inmate correspondence. Last I checked, there was no minimum sober-time requirement for participants, as there is an enormous backlog of inmates, especially men, waiting for letters. This makes C.C.S. a great way to do service very early in sobriety for newcomers too shy to volunteer for commitments.

Naming a Corrections Correspondence chair is another way your group can provide a service opportunity for its members. At my home group, Into Action in Greenpoint, the C.C.S. chair pitches the program during secretary's breaks, passing around sign-up forms and also the famed "pink can," for loose-change donations with which we buy A.A. literature for inmates. Into Action also maintains a post-office box so that C.C.S. participants can have inmate mail delivered to an address other than their homes.


Your group's C.C.S. chair can also join N.Y. Intergroup's Corrections and Treatment Facilities Committee, which meets monthly in Brooklyn and the other boroughs. The committee brings meetings into prisons and rehabs, assembles lit packages for facilities, and more. Visit www.nyintergroup.org/get-involved/ctfc/ online. — Ken K.



Revamped NY Intergroup website adds donation, info update tools

NEW YORK — The Intergroup Association of A.A. of New York has unveiled a long-awaited update of its website, which now features online functionality for making group and individual donations of several types, changes and updates to group/meeting information and even calculating your sober time.

The new donations page at www.nyintergroup.org/contributions allows users to set up one-time or recurring contributions in multiple ways: as a personal or group donation, as a memorial or Anniversary Club gift or even as a Corrections and Treatment Facilities Committee contribution — for either "pink can" literature purchase or CTFC Literature Fund distribution purposes. Those who prefer to hand or mail in donations can also download a printable Seventh Tradition Donation Form.



Similarly, the Group Update Forms page at www.nyintergroup. org/group-resources/forms offers print and online forms for adding/changing/verifying meetings and groups, new group requests and discontinuing a group or meeting. Online updating of group officer information is also available.

Other site highlights include improved online meeting searches and meeting-list PDF downloads; information on events such as the Big Meeting and Bill W. Dance; and volunteer opportunities, including staffing the NY Intergroup phone bank. — *Ken K.*


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Mt. Carmel meetings move ... again
